The Camp Gordon Johnston Association plans to construct two 4,500 square foot building, plus a Memorial Park Pavilion, overlooking the beach where practice amphibious landings occurred before being sent to Europe (including the Normandy landings) and the Pacific. These structure would be steel buildings rated at 160MPH winds and with a 22? high roof allowing a second floor for storage of artifacts, uniforms and equipment not currently on display. We estimate that the Museum holds over \$500.000.00 in artifacts and equipment as well as uniforms and weapons. We need a facility that has moisture control and proper lighting to preserve these valuable assets. (The architectural plans, site location and cost proposals are included in this request.)

The parking area on the property is sufficient to handle a minimum of 15 automobiles, as well a one-tour bus at a time. Inovia consulting group was recently awarded the contract to provide the permitting requirements for the DOT, DEP and NW Water Mgt. as well as coordinating 4m Design Group?s architectural, structural and construction plans for the building. Also beneficial is the location on U.S. Hwy 98 that is a tourist route to central and south Florida.

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Our assets include the artifacts (\$500,000.00), land purchased for \$280,000, a CD worth \$101,000 and \$57,000.00 in our building fund. (Our checking account balance usually averages from \$20,000.00 to \$30,000.00) We can use approximately \$200,000 of these funds toward the building.

Our museum presently receives about 4000 visitors a year, but is growing at a rate of about 20% per year. For this small County in Florida, this museum is a real economic asset. Franklin is one of the poorest Counties in the State of Florida. At last count, it was third from the bottom.

COMMUNITY SUPPORT:

The museum has always had a lot of community support, not only in Franklin County, but Leon, Gadsden, Wakulla as well as Gulf County as well. From the City of Carrabelle we receive \$1,500.00 a year to put on Camp Gordon Johnston Days? A Celebration of the American Veteran. The museum hosts this event each

year to bring back our WWII veterans to Carrabelle. Initially only CGJ veterans came, but today we get veterans from all wars who travel from all over the country. Also included are the present day soldiers, both reservists and active duty personnel. There is a golf tournament which benefits the building fund and museum, registration, boat tours to Dog Island and up the Crooked River, an all you can eat buffet (for no charge) hosted by the local American Legion, a parade downtown, a USO WWII dinner/dance and a meeting to see what improvements might be made for next year. This celebration creates a great sense of pride for the people of Carrabelle. Also of importance is that Publix, Wal-Mart, Sam?s Club and Winn Dixie donate food for this event. Costs incurred by soldiers and veterans are very minimal. This is not a fund raiser, but rather a show of support for what the veterans have done, and what the present day soldiers are doing to preserve our freedoms.

The museum has been invited for the past nine years to participate in the Smithsonian Magazine National Museum Day. The event hosts a live band, refreshments and a German WWII re-enactment troop, also book signing by WWII veteran Kenneth Tucker author of The Last Roll Call, his experiences as a tail gunner on a B-17 bomber.

We have over 20 tour groups annually who come to the museum. These groups include Home School, Church Groups, Boy and Girl Scouts, University and Military Organizations. While visiting Franklin County, they also enjoy the great restaurants in the area. The museum has a selection of menus to help the visitors decide. We also promote other attractions and businesses, such as Hotels, RV Sites and Charter Fishing opportunities in the county.

Ms. Minichiello, the museum curator, also assists the efforts of both Homeland Security (Dangerous unexploded devises awareness) and the Corps of Engineers. Various locations of the Camp held both chemical and armaments, some of which are still being found today.

Both the Franklin County Sheriff?s and Carrabelle Police departments refer people who have found these devices to bring the items to the museum. Ms. Minichiello has a direct line to the bomb squad, located at Tyndale AFB. Air Force personnel will be dispatched to the museum to safely transport and dispose of the items.
